

	Democrat Kathy Jennings, who oversees the state's prosecutor offices, is up for re-election.
1	GOP incumbent Ashley Moody faces Aramis Ayala, former Orlando prosecutor who clashed with state GOP over her opposition to the death penalty.
	Republican Chris Carr seeks re-election against Democrat Jen Jordan, who wishes to curtail en- forcement of abortion bans.
